# The NEW MC Ratings:



The new **Mission Chaplain** designation for Chaplain appointed personnel will be reflected in three (**3**) ratings:



# The NEW MC Rating:



➤ **Mission Chaplain – CAP Support Rating (MC-CS) – the primary MC designation (does not expire) for ALL Chaplain appointed personnel.**



# The NEW ES Rating:



➤ **Mission Chaplain – Disaster Support Rating (MC-DS) – the advanced, optional (updated) designation for those individuals who desire to go on to do more advanced ES training.**



# The NEW AF Rating:



➤ **Mission Chaplain – Air Force Support Rating (MC-AF) –**  
**an additional, optional designation for those individuals who are able to meet special requirements, as designated by USAF, and acquire training that will prepare them to respond to and support USAF specific missions and activities.**



# AF Rating in 2 Categories:



This rating will be divided into the following two functional categories:

**MC-AFN (non-waivered) - Those CAP Chaplain personnel whose appointment has them designated as "non-waivered" chaplains, will be able to be assigned a USAF "Billeted" assignment and perform all duties as requested.**



# AF Rating in 2 Categories:



**MC-AFW (Waivered)** – Those CAP Chaplain personnel whose appointment has them designated as “waivered” chaplains, will **NOT** be able to be assigned a **USAF “Billeted”** assignment. They will be able to perform the following functions:

- a. Military Funerals**
- b. Chapel Worship Services**

**The new Chaplain Support Specialist designation for CDI appointed personnel will be reflected in two (2) ratings:**



# The NEW CSS Basic Rating:



➤ Chaplain Support Specialist – CAP Support Rating (**CSS-CS**) – will be the primary designation (**does not expire**) for ALL CDI appointed personnel and prepares them to be able to support the MC in all CAP duty and mission activity as a part of the Chaplain Support Team.



# The NEW CSS ES Rating:



➤ Chaplain Support Specialist – Disaster Support Rating (**CSS-DS**) –

**will be the advanced designation (updated) for those individuals who desire to do more advanced ES training and will prepare them to support the MC in all "real world" DR/SAR/Nat Disaster/Mass Casualty Missions CAP would be called upon to respond to and support as a part of the Chaplain Support Team.**





# How ChESS Will Operate:



- The Chaplain Corps Emergency Services School will run three (3) times in each given year as follows:
  - a) one (1) week session the 4<sup>th</sup> week of January (offering the MC/CSS - CAP Support Rating).
  - b) two (2) week session in July, as per the regular dates of NESAs, (offering the MC/CSS - CAP Support and Disaster Support Ratings).
  - c) one (1) week session the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of October (offering the MC/CSS - Air Force Support Rating).



# Chaplain Corps ES School (NESAs):



This training environment and resource is offered to those Chaplain Corps personnel (**Chaplains/CDIs**) who truly desire to make the commitment and put in the time to be specially trained to respond to and support the real-world missions we will find CAP engaged in.



# ChESS Advantages:



Aside from the extensive classroom curriculum, the training experience at **ChESS** includes various hands-on, experiential tabletop and VTTX exercises designed to develop the mental and operational acumen needed to understand and respond to and support real world crisis/mass casualty/violence in the workplace mission scenarios.



# ChESS Advantages:



The **ChESS** also allows for a more extended and extensive training environment and experience akin to that received by CAP personnel in the other various ES & Operations disciplines.



# ChESS School Advantages:



**This training venue provides an environment that allows for a faster training track to acquire the required training goals necessary to achieve each proposed level/rating in the program.**



# ChESS Advantages:



Additionally, it enhances the awareness of the existence of the **Chaplain Support Team (CST)** and the **Mission Chaplain (MC)/Chaplain Support Specialist (CSS)** designations and ratings for CAP Chaplain Corps personnel to the ES/Ops community.



# ChESS Prerequisites:



1. Establish **CAP Senior Membership**
2. Successful completion of CAP Professional Development **Level 1**
3. Successful appointment as a **CAP Chaplain** or **CDI**
4. Completion of at least **one (1) full year** as a Chaplain or CDI at the **Squadron level.**



# ChESS Prerequisites:



5. Completion of **CAPP 221-A** for all Chaplains; and, for all CDIs begin Specialty Track **CAPP 225**.
6. Completion of **General Emergency Services** course **116**
7. Completion of **CAPT 117 - Parts 1,2,3**



# ChESS Prerequisites:



8. FEMA Course IS 100: **Introduction to Incident Command System (ICS)**
9. FEMA Course IS-200: **ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents**

**10. FEMA Course IS-700: National Incident Management System (NIMS), An Introduction.**

**11. I-CUT (Intermediate Communication Utilization Training)**



# ChESS Prerequisites:



12. These requirements must be verified by the **Wing Chaplain**, who will then approve and recommend the prospective candidate to the **Region Chaplain** for final approval. Upon their approval and recommendation, the candidate will submit a Standard **NESA** application for review and entrance to the ChESS.



# ChESS Prerequisites:



13. ChESS candidates will then proceed through the school program in a typical **NESA** one (**1**) week or two (**2**) week summer program time frame, based on the rating or ratings they are seeking to acquire.



# ChESS Prerequisites:



14. **(For the MC/CSS - DS Rating)** - Be in reasonably good health and able to master AND maintain the physical requirements needed to accomplish ground operations activity, and to function without impediment in the **"high stress"** environment(s) of mass casualty, large-scale mission scenarios.



# ChESS Prerequisites:



15. Other **behind-the-scene, short-term support roles** may be explored and filled by those individuals whose health and/or physical limitations would be seriously threatened or compromised by frontline ground operations activity.

The need to acquire a sufficient cadre of trained, qualified Mission Chaplains (MC) and GES qualified CDI personnel, adequately equipped to respond to and support large-scale, long-term, sustained missions in the CAP is an issue of vital importance for our Chaplain Corps. The Mission Chaplain (MC)/Chaplain Support Specialist (CSS) Mission Specialty Training Program is offered as a two week offering at Annual CAP National Emergency Services Academy (NESAS) to address this need, known as the CAP Chaplain Corps Emergency Services School (ChESS). Every year a select group of Chaplain Corps personnel (Chaplains/CDIs) who meet specific basic requirements, and who desire to make the commitment to put in the time to be specially trained to respond to and support the real-world missions the CAP is called upon to respond to, will be invited to attend the ChESS for the purpose of receiving training that eventually leads to being designated a Mission Chaplain (MC) or a Chaplain Support Specialist (CSS).
