

America is bouncing-back from COVID. Cadets are eager to return to the field for awesome activities. It's been a long while since we've needed to refer to our Cadet Protection standards. What follows is a friendly reminder about CPP's high points:

Screening & Training

- Every adult leader (senior member, cadet sponsor member, 50-year member, etc.) who is present at a cadet activity needs to have been screened and trained.
- In the eServices Member Search app, "LS Code: A" marked at the top of a personnel record indicates the individual's fingerprints and background check are approved.
- Under the Training tab, Cadet Protection Basic is the minimum standard. This credential expires after 48 months, members may need to refresh their training.
- Activity directors are responsible for verifying that all staff are properly screened and trained prior to the activity's start, including Required Staff Training (CAPP 60-72) for encampments and national special activities.

Wingman System

- Every cadet should be matched with a wingman at every cadet activity.
- Cadets look after their wingman's well-being. Plenty of sleep, food, and water?
 Following the safety rules? Mixing well with flight mates? Not being bullied or bullying others?
- Adult staff are encouraged to use the wingman system, too.

Two-Deep Leadership

- Our cadet protection strategy's most important element remains two-deep adult leadership. A would-be abuser cannot readily groom a potential victim without isolating that youth.
- Activity leaders, supported by everyone on-site, must ensure there are no one-on-one interactions of a senior and cadet in isolated settings.
- The need for confidentiality and/or tact can be fulfilled by
 - o having a second senior member present for a closed-door discussion, or
 - o handling one-on-one interactions in a semi-private setting, i.e.: stepping away from the group for privacy while remaining in sight of the group for the brief conversation.

Guest Speakers

- Cadet activities rely upon "guest speakers" as instructors, tour guides around DoD facilities, safety monitors on a rifle range, spotters on an obstacle course, etc. Quite often, the host facility's staff donates their time and talents for this work.
- Guest speakers, including USAF personnel, have not been screened by CAP nor completed CAP training. Therefore, a screened and trained CAP senior member needs to be present during that visitor's interactions with cadets.

Overnight Events

- Assign male and female cadets to separate sleeping areas.
- Match cadet roommates by age, if reasonably possible.
- Lodge adults separately from the cadets.
- Assign an "Officer of the Day" for the "2:00 am emergency." Instruct cadets to wake their wingman and go as a pair to the OD if adult help is needed.
- Assign times for cadets and seniors to shower separately.
- Prohibit phones / cameras from being in the shower / changing areas.
- Cadets will not serve as sentries or safety monitors during the overnight hours (ie Firewatch or CQ).

Transportation: to, from, and during the event

- Follow the rule of three. If an adult and cadet travel together, a third person must be in the vehicle, except for family and long-time relationships.
- Exception for individual flight training—on long dual cross country flights cadet and instructor may ride alone for short trip to lunch if needed.

Flying

- For orientation flights, If the aircraft can safely carry three souls on board, have a second cadet on the orientation flight.
- For other flight training, conduct ground events in public spaces.
- One-to-one contact outside flight and ground instruction is forbidden.
- Flight trading conducted external to flight academies or Cadet Wings requires submission of CAPF60-82 to ensure a second CAP adult is aware of the one-on-one training.
- Unannounced drop-ins are encouraged to ensure the cadet's safety.

Speak Up About Boundary Concerns

- If anyone has reason to believe another person has overstepped CPP standards, that person must be corrected. A friendly reminder is usually all that's needed.
- Boundary concerns should be brought to the attention of the activity director or unit commander.
- Cadets are authorized to go to any adult at any time, regardless of chain of command, to report CPP concerns without fear of reprisal.

Hot Weather Operations

- Monitor the heat index every three hours in temperatures greater than 80°
- Abide by the protective measures for the respective heat index for hot weather training, including train/rest times and blouse removal.
- For cadet activities located on military installations, commanders and activity directors will monitor heat flag conditions at least every three hours and abide by the respective protective measures.
