

# MAINE WING Wing Assists State with COVID-19 Missions

Maine Wing cadets and senior members helped out at the York Hospital drivethrough COVID-19 testing center from May-July. Two to four worked eighthour shifts on weekdays, with a total of 24 participating.

"I am extremely proud of the dedication of both cadets and officers volunteering their time," said Col. Blain A. Cote, wing commander. "Some of the members worked every day for weeks helping out. If it wasn't for that dedication, this testing site would have not worked out so well." Seven of the wing's nine squadrons and the Brunswick Flight participated in the mission. "We even had one cadet from the Bangor squadron come from 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours away to work, and her parents drove her. That's dedication," Cote said.

"It's been a tough year for Maine Wing cadets and officers — no face-to-face meetings or social gatherings," he said. "But performing missions during this pandemic was important to help people in time of need. This was the biggest CAP mission since World War II." Toward the end of 2020, the wing was starting to perform more missions for the Maine Emergency Management Agency, delivering personal protective equipment (PPE) and testing kits to first responders. On Dec. 1, members delivered 14,500 cloth masks to emergency workers in Oxford County.

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Before World War II, Maine newspaperman Guy P. Gannett combined with pilot and minister Gill Robb Wilson and publisher Thomas H. Beck to propose Wilson's Civil Air Defense Services program as a model for organizing the nation's civilian aviation resources. Their proposal for a Civil Air Patrol was approved by the Commerce, Navy and War departments in November 1941, and CAP National Headquarters opened its doors in December. Gannett served as Maine's first CAP wing commander until June 1, 1949.
- The 38th Composite Squadron in Bar Harbor can trace its roots back to World War II at CAP Coastal Patrol Base 20.
  Submarine detection classes were held in a pilots' lounge after each dawn patrol along the coastline between Rockland and Eastport.
