### OPERATION OF THE CAP HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAM

This Supplement is published by direction of CAPR 160-1. Supplement requirements reference Indiana State Law concerning the handling of medications at youth camps, and parallel those requirements. This supplement must be used in tandem with CAPR 160-1 and not used as a “stand alone” document. This is an amended publication.

CAPR 160-1, dated 3 June 2013, is supplemented as follows:

**Paragraph 1-7j. Added.** A senior member who has completed Red Cross Standard First Aid Course or its equivalent will be present at an activity involving cadets that is more than 72 hours in continuous duration and shall be designated as the activity Health Supervisor or equivalent CAP duty assignment (410 IAC 6-7.2-17, a).

**Paragraph 1-7k. Added.** On those activities of more than 72 hours in duration, a member of the activity health service staff shall conduct a health screening of each cadet to identify any illness or communicable disease using the CAPF 160. The screening shall occur not more than twelve (12) hours after arrival at the activity and include a check of medications in use by each cadet (410 IAC 6-7.2-17, b).

**Paragraph 4-3.** The CAPF 163 and the “Medical Information” section of the CAPF 160 will contain a list of those medications that are authorized by the parent for all cadets regardless of age (410 IAC 6-7.2-17, e).

**Paragraph 4-4.** Medications for cadets (including both prescription and non-prescription medication as defined by this regulation), except those a physician prescribed for self-administration such as epinephrine pens, inhalers, etc., shall be locked in a cabinet, box, or drawer or stored in a safe place inaccessible to cadets (410 IAC 6-7.2-17, e). Prescription medication will be in their original containers and will have their original labels attached.

**Paragraph 4-6.** CAPF 160 and 163 should also be used for non-minor aged cadets to insure accountability of medications in the activity environment since Indiana Law does not allow medications to be available to children (410 IAC 6-7.2-17, e).
