Four Chaplains Day

February 3

This year marks the 73rd anniversary of an event that has given definition to what it means to be a chaplain. The Four Chaplains were four United States Army chaplains who gave their lives to save other soldiers during World War II.

The chaplains, who all held the rank of lieutenant, were the Methodist Reverend George L. Fox, the Jewish Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, the Roman Catholic Priest John P. Washington and the Reformed Church in America Reverend Clark V. Poling.

The four chaplains were sailing on the USAT Dorchester troop transport on February 3, 1943 when the vessel was torpedoed by the German submarine U-223. As the vessel sank, the four chaplains calmed the frightened soldiers and sailors, aided in the evacuation of the ship, and helped guide wounded men to safety. The chaplains also gave up their own life vests when the supply ran out. 230 of the 902 men aboard the ship were rescued.

On December 19, 1944, all four chaplains were posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and the Distinguished Service Cross. The Chaplain's Medal for Heroism was authorized in 1961 and posthumously presented by the President of the United States to the families of the chaplains. The chaplains were also honored with a stamp, issued in 1948 and by an act of Congress designating February 3 as **“Four Chaplains Day.”**

Introductions

Have you ever wondered how to properly introduce two people to each other? The great thing is that it is covered in CAPP 3. I would like to systematically cover the CAPP 3 so we can properly show respect. Page 12 in The CAP pamphlet 3 - *Civil Air Patrol Guide to Protocol* covers proper introductions.

Normally, a man is introduced to a woman, in such a manner as,

"Jane, I'd like you to meet Colonel Smith."

"Sir, this is my good friend Jane Brown."

You honor the woman by saying her name first.

When you introduce people in uniform, whether they are men or women, follow the rule of rank. The senior is named first:

"Colonel Miller, I'd like you to meet Captain Susan Hastings, my Deputy Commander for cadets."

"Captain Hastings, this is Colonel Miller, our Wing Commander."

Two other general rules are:

- (a) young people are presented to older people (barring rule of rank), and
- (b) a single person is usually presented to a group.

I am glad that we will be reviewing this together.

MEET OUR CAP CHAPLAINS

Ch, Lt Col Marcus Taylor

Secretary to the Chaplain Corps Executive Council (CCEC) and the Chaplain Corps Advisory Council (CCAC)



Chaplain Marcus Taylor serves on the staff of the National Chief of Chaplains as the Secretary of the CAP Chaplain Corps Executive Council (CCEC) and the Chaplain Corps Advisory Council (CCAC).

The Chaplain Corps Advisory Council (CCAC) is made up of the National Chaplain Corps Executive Council and the eight Region Chaplains, as well as former Chiefs of the Chaplain Corps. The purpose of the CCAC is to advise the National Executive Committee on current issues in CAP Chaplaincy.

Chaplain, Lt Col Marcus Taylor was named as secretary to the Chaplain Corps Executive (CCEC) and Advisory Councils (CCAC) at their joint meeting held at the August 2016 CAP National Conference in Orlando. Chaplain Taylor succeeds Chaplain, Lt Col James Sickmeyer in this position as part of a policy to increase the number and the breadth of experience among our Chaplain Corps leadership.

Before assuming his present position, Chaplain Taylor had served since 2011 as the Deputy Region Chaplain of the Southeast Region. In this role he had been tasked to direct the Southeast Region Chaplain Corps Staff College (SER CCSC). Under his leadership the college became the forerunner and test bed for doing advanced level Emergency Services (ES) training, engaging in training activities like a Virtual Tabletop Exercise based on a Hurricane scenario conducted jointly by FEMA, EMI, and the CDC. The 2015 SER Chaplain Corps Staff College site was one of nine sites across the country and the Virgin Islands participating in the exercise.¹ This was just one among many such types of Tabletop Exercises (TTX), VTTXs, and advanced level training courses offered at the SER CCSC during his leadership.

As a result of the work he was doing in the SER CCSC, Chaplain Taylor was assigned and has been leading the Task Force commissioned to formulate the new Mission Chaplain (MC) and Chaplain Support Specialist (CSS) Mission Specialty Training Program, and the CAP Chaplain Corps Training Academy Program. The Academy will operate as part of the CAP National Emergency Services Academy (NESA), and will function as the premiere ES training venue for the Chaplain Corps. The task force has prepared drafts of these new programs, which have been reviewed by the Chief of Chaplains, and will be previewed by the Chief at the 2016 Chaplain Corps Region Staff Colleges. Three ratings, CAP Support, FEMA Support, and Air Force Support, will be available for the Chaplain Trainee seeking to become MC rated; and, CAP Support and FEMA Support for Character Development Instructor (CDI) Trainees seeking the CSS rating. These ES specialties will provide the training needed to implement an increased emphasis on mission preparedness, with our chaplains and character development instructors being adequately prepared to provide support for all CAP Level, FEMA Level (“real-world” DR/SAR/Natural Disaster/Mass Casualty Missions), and Air Force Assigned missions, activities, and training events. For this and other efforts, Taylor received the National Commander’s Commendation Award at the 2015 National Conference.

During 2010, Chaplain Taylor, then Florida Wing Chaplain, played a key role in support of the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill Response Mission. As CAP flew missions to cover the Gulf Oil spill, Taylor found himself assigned to the Joint Mission Response Team comprised of Coast Guard, Army and Air National Guard Chaplains. He found a single Coast Guard chaplain giving chaplain support to the Oil Spill Mission, while also covering his assigned area of states from Florida through Louisiana. The Florida Wing of CAP alone had more chaplains than all those serving in the entire Coast Guard. When he presented the Coast Guard Captain, serving as the Mission Commander, with “our qualifications, and what we could bring to the table to support their efforts in this mission, our involvement was gladly welcomed.”² Chaplain Taylor’s contributions included providing on-site counseling for staff, leading worship services, participating in ceremonial events, serving as an advisor to command staff, and visiting local communities to provide encouragement and information.

Having received his CAP Chaplain appointment in 2001, Chaplain Taylor has filled the positions of Squadron Chaplain, TN Squadrons 183 & 185 (Mar 2002 – Jan 2004); Group III Chaplain, TN Wing (Jan 2004 – Aug 2004); Deputy Wing Chaplain, DE Wing (Sept 2004 – Dec 2004); Wing Chaplain, DE Wing (Dec 2004 – Aug 2007); Deputy Region Chaplain for Diversity Affairs, Middle East Region (Aug 2007 – Mar 2008); Wing Chaplain, FL Wing (Mar 2008 – Sept 2011); and, Deputy Region Chaplain, Southeast Region (Sept 2011 – Aug 2015). He did military service in the US Navy and in the Tennessee State Guard. His pastoral ministry began with his ordination to ministry in 1975 and included leadership of a total of eleven congregations in the African Methodist Episcopal and Seventh Day Adventist Churches. He and his wife Chris, are, jointly, the proud parents of five sons and three daughters; grandparents of eighteen grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. His personal motto for ministry is, “A voice crying in the wilderness preparing people to meet the Lord.”


